The Center is focused on transforming the lives of those affected by dementia. Two overarching goals of the Center are (1) To establish a new direction for caring for those individiuals and families who are, or will be, impacted by dementia; and (2) To shape the design, programs and construction of memory support centers across the county and far beyond. Some of the key design and operating principles include:

- **Enabling** those with dementia to live as normal lives as possible.
- Providing continuity with the Resident's former life, prior to memory loss, by learning as much as we can from the family and friends.
- Caring for the Resident without the confinement traditionally used in memory care, giving them a sense of freedom.
- Stimulating the Resident's mind, body, and spirit.

- **Striving** to help Residents thrive, even as his or her dementia progresses.
- Treating the Resident with respect and dignity always.
- Providing moments of joy, even if the Resident remembers them only for a brief time.
- Ensuring families do not fear or dread moving their loved ones into memory care.



JOIN US FOR A GATHERING!

Over the next few weeks and months, campaign volunteers are hosting small Zoom and in-person informational Gatherings of Residents, families, and other friends. We will meet in small groups (6 to 12 usually) to see and hear an informational presentation about the status of the Memory Care Center project. These are informal, interactive, and purely informational. No solicitation of funds occurs. All independent living Residents will be invited to a Gathering at some point and we hope you say "yes."
